**Contracts For Armor Awarded.**  
 Washington, Oct. 27. — Secretary Moody has decided the long standing question of the awards for furnishing armor for the battleships Vermont, Minnesota, Kansas, Mississippi and Idaho. The Midvale Steel Company, of Philadelphia, gets the contract for supplying 6000 tons, and the Carnegie and Bethlehem Companies a contract for supplying 5000 tons each. The companies named comprised all those who submitted bids for furnishing the plate. The bids of the Carnegie and Bethlehem Companies were identical, namely, \$6,944,000, the delivery to begin in nine months, while the Midvale Company's bid was \$5,895,932, delivery to begin in 20 months.
