### Fish Laws.

The following summary shows when fish may be taken: how and the number:

All unlimited except brook trout, of which only fifty may be taken in one day.

Rock bass, white bass, strawberry or grass bass and crappie, not less than five inches. Black bass not less than seven in the State, or nine inches in Lake Erie.

Green or Oswego bass, blue pike, pike, perch or walleyed pike, Susquehanna jack salmon, pike, pickeral and muscalonge, not less than nine inches except in Lake Erie, muscalonge must be fifteen inches long. The above fish may be caught from June 15 to Feb. 15th.

Penobscot salmon or grilse, not less than three pounds each in weight, March 1 to August 15, inclusive.

Trout, and species, except lake trout, 6 inches long, April 15 to July 31, inclusive. Lake or salmon trout not less than nine inches, January 1 to Sept. 1, inclusive.

Perch or sunfish, catch all you can, June 15 to Feb. 15, inclusive.

Striped bass or rock fish nine inches.

Shad, herring or alewife, or sturgeon January 1 to June 20, inclusive. No fishing from Saturday at sunset to Sunday at midnight.

Eels may be taken in fish baskets with wing walls.

By taking out a license from the County Treasurer, \$5, outlines can be used from sunrise to sunset for catching catfish, eels, carp, suckers; line on the bottom, cut or dead bait, and the owner's name marked plainly thereon.

Fyke nets without wing walls may be used in water not inhabited by brook trout during the month of March April, May, October, November and December, for eels, carp, catfish and suckers.

No game fish shall be taken except with a "hook and line." This makes tip-ups, floating lines, nets and explosives illegal.

Frogs and terripin are protected.

Frogs may be taken from July 1 to to Sept. 1.

Terripin commonly called turtles, may be taken from November 1 to March 15.

Single lines, one hook on line with cut or dead bait, may be used in trout streams to catch eels, carp, catfish and suckers, provided the lines are weighted down on the bottom.

Wanton or wilful starting fire in another's wood, fine \$300 and twelve months imprisonment; \$50 reward to the prosecutor.—Act of June 11, 1879.
