


Incendiarism .-- Somebody seems persistent in the determination to burn the property of Mr, M. E Coolbaugh. Two or three times during the pas year successful attempts have been made on his buildings in Dunmore-the last only four or five weeks ago, which not only destroyed his large unoc cupied hotel, but a large amount of property beside Having pretty thoroughly " cleaned out" his prop erty there, the scene of the incendiary's operatio has been shifted to Scranton. Yesterday morning, about 3 o'clock, fire was discovered raging in his new brick block in this place. The torch had been applied in two places at the same time-in the room occupied by Ayres & Stone as a Hat and Cap Store and in the garret. The fire had gained considerable progress in the store when discovered and had it not been for the commendable promptness of Washing ton Fire Company No. 2, and the somewhat later efforts of the Nay-Augs, the building, as well as the lives of Mrs. Omit and her, family, who occupied rooms in the third floor, would have been destroyed As it was, the store-room was considerably charred a portion of the floor burned through, Messrs Ayres & Stone's stock of hats and caps badly damaged, and the persons in the third story nearly sufficiented .-The fire in the garret did not get so far advanced, a few pails of water sufficing to extinguish it .- Scranton Republican.

Camp Ross .-- All these who have visited Wyo ming Valley have not failed to observe its broad river its comfortable farm houses, its green hills and public monument. There are but few who have not heard of its revolutionary fame. What place mere delightful, then, could be desired for a camp. What ground more appropriate than that consecrated to freedom by the heroes of the Revolution ?


The people of Luzerne are indebted to the admirable judgment of Gen. Dana, Senator Ketcham and Judge Ross that such a charming place was chosen for Camp Ross. It is situated on quite an eminence about two miles north-east of Kingston. Its facilities for water are unequalled. There are three or four springs quite near to the Camp, and one is of sufficient elevation to conduct the water wherever desired.

If the sanitary condition of the troops is well attended to, it seems to us impossible that any of the diseases commonly incident to camp life can affect them. The Camp is so situated that the occupants have the full benefit of every cooling breeze that passes through the valley, and the ground is of such an elevation that no danger need be apprehended from any deadly miasm.

There is only one objection as to the location of the Camp, and that is, that there is scarcely room enough for manœuvering a regiment, but the otherwise desirableness of the location, as regards health, water, &s., counterbalances all other objections.

There are now four companies in Camp \*command-ed by Captains Conyngham, Reichart, Sornborgor, and Hoyt.

The soldiers already manifest a warlike spirit in andry hieroglyphics spread upon their tents, such as, "Pine Swamp Ingins," "Irish Tigers," "Lion's Den," "Forty Thieves," &c They appear content-ed and fare well. We saw upon their tables good white bread, fresh beef, pies, &c. --Wholesome enough food for any one.-Scranton Republicna.
