Boys, Read This!—The laws of this State in regard to drafting, require that all between the ages of 18 and 45 be enrolled; but they do not authorize the drafting of any who have not arrived at the age of 21 years. The draft, therefore, will be from the men. The boys can step in and take the places of their fathers and brothers, as substitutes, if they desire.

Exempts.—Persons in the townships which have already furnished their quotas of troops, claiming to be exempt from the draft on account of age, physical disability, or any other cause, should appear and claim such exemption on the day fixed by the commissioner, the same as if they were actually liable to an immediate draft, as this is their last and only chance to correct any error that may have been made by the Deputy Marshal.
