PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, by the laws of this Commonwealth, it is made "the duty of the Sheriff of every county to give notice of the general elections, by publications in one or more newspapers of the county, at least twenty days before the election," and to enumerate the names of the persons to be elected," and to designate the place at which the election is to be held." Therefore, I, LEVI H. STEPHENS, High Sheriff of Wyoming county, do hereby make known and proclaim to the qualified electors of Wyoming county, that a GENERAL ELECTION will be held throughout said county, on

Tuesday, the 14th day of October, being the second Tuesday in said month, at the several districts within the county, to wit:

Brimstair, at the house occupied by T. D. Spring, in Laceyville.

Clinton, at the new school house in the village of Factoryville.

Falls, at the house of Peter Stroth, in Eaton township.

Exeter, at the house of Solomon Brown in Exeter township.

Forkeston, at the house of Hiram Hitchcock, now occupied by A. P. Burges, in Forkeston township.

Falls, at the house now occupied by Eos Deemer, in Falls township.

Lemon, at the school house near H. G. Ely, in Lemon township.

Monroe, at the house of John Phoenix, in Monroe township.

Mehoopany, at the house of Peter Bender, in Mehoopany township.

Meshoppen, at the house of Daniel Hankinson, in Meshoppen township.

North Branch, at the house of Winters & Howard, at Centremoreland Corners, in Northmoreland township.

Nicholson, at the house now occupied by E. N. Bacon, in Nicholson township.

North Branch, at the school house near the store of John Ploots, in North Branch township.

Overfield, at the old school house near Lawrence Adams, in Overfield township.

Tunkhannock Borough, at the Court House in Tunkhannock.

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Windham, at the house of David Fisk, in Windham township.

Washington, at the Baptist church on Russell Hill in Washington township.

It is further directed that the election at the several districts shall be opened between the hours of 8 and 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue open without interruption or adjournment, until 7 o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed. The officers elected last spring shall serve at the general election.

Numbers to be elected at the time and places aforesaid, are:

One person for Auditor General, of the State of Pennsylvania.

One person for Surveyor General, of the State of Pennsylvania.

One person for President Judge of the 26th Judicial District, composed of the Counties of Columbia, Sullivan and Wyoming.

One person for Congressman, of the 13th Congressional District, composed of the Counties of Bradford, Wyoming, Sullivan, Columbia, and Montour.

One person for State Senator, of the 9th Senatorial District, composed of the Counties of Bradford, Susquehanna, Wyoming, and Sullivan.

Two persons for Representatives, in the Counties of Wyoming, Sullivan, Montour and Columbia.

One person for County Commissioner, of the County of Wyoming.

One person for County Treasurer of the County of Wyoming.

One person for District Attorney of the County of Wyoming.

One person for County Auditor of the County of Wyoming.

One person for Coroner of the County of Wyoming.

It is further directed that the meeting of the return judges, to be held in the Court House in the Borough of Tunkhannock, on the 17th day of October, next, to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the seventeenth day of October.

And in and by the said Act, I am further directed to give notice that every person, excepting justices of the peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States, or of this State, or of any incorporated district, or of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or any officer of any such election shall be eligible to any then to be voted for.

In pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," passed the 24th day of July, A. D. 1859.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

"That the Inspectors and Judges chosen as aforesaid, shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the districts to which they respectively belong, before nine o'clock on the morning of the second Tuesday in October, in each and every ward and precinct of the County of Wyoming, and that each and every qualified voter of each district, judge or any officer of any such election shall be eligible to any then to be voted for.

"In all cases where the names of a person claiming to vote is not to be found on the list furnished by the Commissioners and Assessors, or his right to vote whether local or otherwise is in question, or if any qualified citizen, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to examine such person on oath, as to his qualifications, and if he claims to have resided within the State for one year or more, his oath shall be sufficient proof thereof; but he shall make proof by at least one competent witness who shall be a qualified elector that he has resided within the district for more than ten days next immediately preceding the election, and shall also himself swear that his bona fide residence, in pursuance of his lawful calling or business, is within the district, and that he did not then intend to leave the district for the purpose of voting therein.

"Every person qualified as aforesaid, and who shall make due proof, if required of his residence and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward, or district in which he shall reside.

"If any person or persons shall make any bet or wager upon the result of any election in this Commonwealth or shall offer to make any such bet or wager either by verbal proclamation thereof, or by any written or printed instrument, challenge or receive any person or persons to make such a bet or wager, upon conviction thereof, he or they shall forfeit and pay three times the amount so bet or offered to bet.

"If any person not by law qualified shall fraudulently vote at any election within this Commonwealth, or being otherwise qualified, shall vote out of his proper district, or if any person knowing the want of

such qualification shall aid or procure such person to vote, the person or persons offending shall be on conviction, be confined not exceeding two hundred dollars and be imprisoned for a term not exceeding three months.

"If any person shall vote at more than one election district, or otherwise fraudulently vote more than once on the same day, or shall fraudulently aid and deliver to the Inspectors two tickets together, with the intention to illegally vote, or shall vote the same, or if any person shall advise or procure another so to do, or if they so offending, on conviction, be fined in any sum not less than fifty, nor more than one hundred dollars, and be imprisoned for any term not less than three, nor more than four months.

"If any person not qualified to vote in this Commonwealth, or who shall be disqualified by law, or who shall be disqualified by the purpose of issuing tickets or influencing citizens qualified to vote, he shall on conviction, be fined and pay any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars for every such offence, and be imprisoned for any term not exceeding three months.

"No person shall be permitted to vote at any election as aforesaid, other than a white freeman of the age of 21 years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he claims to vote, at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and within two years have paid a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least ten days before election. But a citizen of the United States, who has previously been a qualified voter of this State, and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district, and paid taxes aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months. Provided, That the white freemen citizens of the United States, between the ages of 21 and 22 years, and having resided in this State one year, and in the election district 10 days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid taxes.

"No persons shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants furnished by the Commissioners as aforesaid unless first he produces a receipt for the payment within two years of a State or County tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution, and give satisfactory evidence, either on his or on the affirmation of another, that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt shall make oath to the payment thereof; or second, if he claims a right to vote by being admitted to vote by reason of having paid a tax of the word 'age,' if he shall be permitted to vote on account of his age, and in either case the reason of such vote shall be called out to the clerks, who shall mark in the list of voters kept by them.

"If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent any officer of an election under this act from holding such election or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, or shall interfere with him in the execution of his duty or shall block up or attempt to block the window or door of any such officer, or shall be held, or shall knowingly disturb the peace at such election, or shall use or practice any intimidation, threats, force, or violence, with design to influence unduly or overawe any elector to prevent him from voting or to restrain the freedom of choice, such person on conviction in any case, shall be fined not exceeding five hundred dollars, and be imprisoned for any time not less than one, nor more than twelve months; and if it shall be shown to the Court where the trial of such offence shall be had, that the person so offending was native or foreign—who advertised in this or any other paper, gets a copy of Dr. Young's book, and read it carefully.
