Owners of Unpatented Lands .-- The act of Assembly in relation to the graduation and valuation of unpatented lands by the commissioners of the several counties of Pennsylvania, will expire by its own limitation, on the first day of August, 1863 .-Those interested, had better take advantage of it in time, and have their lands appraised py the commis sioners and patented, before the date given. The Act of Assembly, of April 10th, 1835, to

graduate lands on which money is due and unpaid to the Commonwealth," is the one to which we refer. By this act the Commi scioners of the several counties are constituted a board of appraisers, with power to classify all lands on which any purchasemodey is due to the Commonwealth, if desired to do to by the owner thereof. On all lands classed No. 4, no interest is charged on the purchase-money remaining unpaid. After the first of August, the County Commissioners will have no authority to classify lands, and interest will be chargeable on the balance due on all unpatented lands, except such as were sold at eighty cents per acre.
