CHAPTER 1. The Manufacture of Woolen Goods, both in the household and in the factories; has become of great importance on account of its forming at present our principal articles of clothing. The nature of our climate make it necessary, and the scarcity of Cotton has greatly increased it was the of works.

mate make it necessary, and the scarcity of Cotton has greatly increased the value of wool and Fabricks made from it and being engaged in the business of making Clorh and Flannel, and also a oll Carding, and Cloth Dressing, we have thought a few remarks with regard to hardling Wool, and the proper process of Manufacture, might be of service to the country, and a benefit to ourselves.

The first process with the farmer who intends to make his wool into rolls for spinning and weaving at home, after washing and shearing, is assorting the qualities. This we do not expect a farmer to do as perfectly as a regular manufacturer, but by trying he will approximate towards it, and be amply paid for the little pains required, by having an even thread and sincother fabric. The fleece should be whole and be spread out on a table—the coarsest wool will be four don the skirts of the fleece, and whole and be spread out on a table—the coarsest wool will be fourd on the skirts of the fleece, and can easily be distinguished by looking closely to the fibre. Two qualities from each fleece with perhaps be close enough for ordinary purposes, but as the sheep in our country differ much in their grades of wool—the coarse part of one may do to go with the fluer part of another, and thus make three or four qualities out of the lot. If it is going to the manafactory or to market, the fleece should not be torn, factory or to market, the fleece should not be torn, but after removing the tag-locks, should be rolled up

compactly, skin out side. Not less than one pound of lard, fresh better or oil should be sent with every ten pounds of wool going to the carding utachine.

The next thing of importance is of cour e to be well carded, for which we will be entirely responsiwell carded, for which we will be entirely responsible, but in the matter of spinning and weaving, we have another caution to add, Unless the yarn is evenly twicked, and beat up evenly in the loom, the cloth shrinks unevenly in fulling—making some places wide and others narrow, and if the finisher succeeds in pressing out the wrineles, the cloth will resume its contortion again when made into a garnent, and the mechanic is sometimes wrongfully blamed for a coat, s becoming luntern jawed on a man's back. It is easily avoided by giving the man's back. It is easily avoided by giving the wheel in equal number of turns to a given length of thread drawn out. We find this difficulty increasing of late years, and have come to the conclusion that if some of the spinners do not keep better time on their pianos than on their spinning wheels, we should hate dreadfully to listen to their made.
