Manufacture of Woolen Goods!

The Manufacture of Woolen Goods, both in the household and in the factories, has become of great importance on account of the forming at present our principal articles of clothing. The nature of our climate makes it necessary, and the scarcity of Cotton has greatly increased the value of wool and Fabrics made from it. We are engaged in the business of making Cloth and Flannel, and all other Carding, and Cloth Pressing, and have thought a few remarks with regard to handling Wool, and the proper process of Manufacture, might be of service to the country, and a benefit to ourselves.

The first process with a farmer who intends to make his wool into rolls for spinning and weaving at home, after washing and shearing, is to assort the qualities. This we do not expect a farmer to do as perfectly as a regular manufacturer, but by trying to do it, he will find it to be a very profitable and little pains required, by having an even thread and smoother fabric. The fleece should be whole and be spread out on a table—the coarsest can easily be distinguished by looking closely to the fibre. Two qualities from each fleece will perhaps be close enough for ordinary purposes, but as the sheep in our country differ much in their grades of wool, a coarse part of one may do to go with the finer part of another, and make three or four qualities out of the lot. It is going to the manufacturer or to market, the fleece should not be torn, but after removing the tag-locks, should be rolled up compactly, skin out side. Not less than one pound of fresh fleeces should be sent with every ten pounds of wool going to the carding machine.

The next thing of importance is of course to be well carded, for which we will be entirely responsible. But in the matter of spinning and weaving, we have another caution to add. Unless the yarn is evenly twisted, and kept up evenly in the loom, the cloth shrinks unevenly in fulling—making some places wide and others narrow, and if the finisher succeeds in pressing out the wrinkles, the cloth will remain uneven, and in whole or in part, will be ruined. It is easily avoided by giving the wheel an equal number of turns to a given length of thread drawn out. We find that this difficulty increases with late years, and have come to the conclusion that if some of the spinners do not keep better time on their spindles than on their spinning wheels, we should have readily to listen to their music.

As every moment of labor should be employed to the best advantage, and every ounce of material be appropriated to the best purpose, on account of our war, we propose to write some other chapters on our branch of business after this is read sufficiently to be remembered, and shall endeavor to do our work as well as enough to be a credit to our name, and make ourselves start enough to beat a farmer through a year's campaign at least.

And in case of death of any soldier from wound or disease contracted in the service, his wife or personal representatives are entitled, to the same to which he would have been entitled if he had been living. A JOINT RESOLUTION,

PROPOSING CERTAIN Amendments to the Constitution.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met: That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof:

SECTION 1. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any active military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of the Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

SECTION 2. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections, eight and nine, as follows:

SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been or may hereafter be conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.

SECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been or may hereafter be conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.

It will be seen that even the present gold revenue of the Government are largely in excess of the wants of the Treasury for the payment of gold interest, while the recent increase of the tariff will doubtless raise the annual receipts from customs on the same amount of importations, to \$150,000,000 per annum.
