Manufacture of Woolen Goods ! CHAPTER 1.

The Manufacture of Woolen Goods, both in the importance on account of gits forming at present our principal articles of clothing. The nature of our climate make it necessary, and the scarcity of Cotton has greatly increased the value of wool and Fabricks made from it and being engaged in the business of making Cloth and Flannel, and also soll Carding, and Cloth Description of the country of th and Cloth Dressing. We have thought a few remarks with regard to handling Wool, and the proper process of Manufacture, might be of service to the country, and a benefit to ourselves

The first process with the farmer who intends to

make his wool into rolls for spinning and weaving at home, after washing and shearing, is assorting the qualities. This we do not expect a farmer to do as perfectly as a regular manufacturer, but by trying he will approximate towards it, and be amply paid for the little pains required, by having an even thread and smoother fabric. The fleece should be whole and be spread out on a table—the coarsest wool will be fourd on the skirts of the fleece, and can easily be distinguished by looking closely to the fibre Two qualities from each fleece will perhaps be close enough for ordinary purposes, but as the sheep in our country differ much in their grades of wool—the coarse part of one may do to go with the finer part of another, and thus make three or four qualities out of the lot. If it is going to the manufactory or to market, the fleece should not be torn, but after removing the tag-locks, should be rolled up compactly, skin out side. Not less than one pound of lard, fresh butter or oil should be sent with every

ten pounds of wool going to the carding machine.

The next thing of importance is of cour e to he well carded, for which we will be entirely responsible but in the matter of spinning and wearing, we have another caution to add. Unless the yarn is evenly twisted, and beat up evenly in the loom, the cloth shrinks unevenly in fulling—making some places wide and others narrow, and if the finisher succeeds in pressing out the wrincles, the cloth will resume its contartion again when made into a grant sume its contortion again when made into a gar-nent, and the mechanic is sometimes wrongfully blamed for a coat's becoming lantern jawed on a man's back. It is easily avoided by giving the wheel in equal number of turns to a given length of thread drawn out. We find this difficulty increasing of late years, and have come to the conclusion that if some of the spinners do not keep better time on their pianos than on their spinning wheels, we should hate dreadfully to listen to their music.

As every moment of labor should be employed to As every moment of tabor should be employed to the best advantage, and every onnce of material be appropriated to the best purpose, on account of our war, we propose to write some other chapters on our branch of business after this is read sufficiently to be remembered, and shall endeavor to do our work nice enough for a balmoral skirt or a doctor's coat, and make towever, stout and make trowsers stout enough to last a farmer through a year's campaign, at least.

AJOINT RESOLUTION, PROPOSING CERTAIN

Amendments to the Constitution. Be is resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assombly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of

the tenth article thereof.

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution to be designated section

four, as follows; Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified elec-SECTION 4. Whenever any of the qualified elec-tors of this Commonwealth shall be in any active military service, under a requisition from the Presi-dent of the United States, or by the authority of the Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under uch regulations as are or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.'

Section 2. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections, eight and nine, as follows: "Section 8. No bill shall be passed by the legis-lature, containing more than one subject which shall be clearly expressed in the ti le, except appropria-

"Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been or may hereafter to conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth." pon the courts of this Commonwealth."
