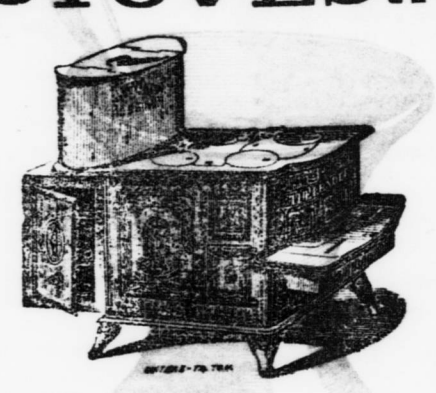

U. S. 10-40 Bonds.

These Bonds are issued under the Act of Congress of March 3d, 1864, which provides that all Bond issued under this Act shall be EXEMPT FROM TAXATION by or under any state or municipal authority.

It will be seen that even the present gold revenue of the Government are largely in excess of the wants of the Treasury for the payment of gold interest, while the recent increase of the tariff will doubtless raise the annual receipts from customs on the same amount of importations, to \$150,000,000 per annum.
