U.S. 7 30 Loan.

The Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will be received for Coup in Treasury with annual interest from Aug. 15th, 1864 with three-thirtieths per cent per annum - principle and interest both to be paid in lawful money.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent gold bearing bonds, payable not less than five nor more than twenty years from their date, as the Government may elect. They will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000, and all subscriptions must be for fifty dollars or some multiple of fifty dollars.

The notes will be transmitted to the owners free of transportation charges as soon after the receipt of the original Certificates of Deposit as they can be prepared.

As the notes draw interest from that date, persons making deposits subsequent to that date must pay the interest accrued from date of note to date of deposit.

Parties depositing twenty-five thousand dollars and upwards for these notes at any one time will be paid by the Treasury Department up on the receipt of a bill for the amount deposited by the officer with whom the deposit was made. No deductions for commissions must be made from the deposits.
