For the Benefit of Soldiers' Orphans.

By an act of the Legislature of Pennsylvania approved May 9, 1864, the Governor was authorized to receive the sum of fifty thousand dollars, offered by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, for the education and maintenance of destitute orphan children of deceased soldiers and sailors.

The persons entitled to the benefits of this Act are the children of either sex under the age of fifteen resident in this State, and the wife of a private or soldier, and dependent upon either public or private charity for support, or on the exertions of a mother or other person destitute of means to afford proper education and maintenance, of fathers who have been killed or died of wounds received or disease contracted in the service of the United States, or in the regular army of the naval service of this State, or in the regular army of the naval service of the United States, but who were at the time of entering such service, actual bona fide residents of Pennsylvania.

Such children will be boarded, clothed and educated; those under the age of six years, in any suitable school that will receive them on proper terms; and over six years of age, in one of the State Normal Schools.
