

first produces a receipt for the payment within 2 years of a State or County tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution and give satisfactory evidence, either on his oath or affirmation of another, that he has paid such tax or on failure to produce a receipt shall make good the payment thereof or second, if he claims a right to vote, by being an elector between the ages of 21 and 22 years, he shall dispose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application and make such proof of residence in his district as required by this Act, and that he is really the owner of the account given him that he is of the age of 21 years, and give such other evidence as is required by this Act, whereupon the name of the person, admitted to vote, shall be inserted in the alphabetical list by the Inspectors, and a note made opposite thereto by writing the word 'tax,' is he shall be admitted to vote by reason of having paid a tax, or the word 'age,' if he shall be permitted to vote on account of his age, and neither case the reason of such admission shall be called out to the clerk, who shall mark it in the list of voters kept by them.

Agreeable to the provisions of the sixty-first section of said Act, every general and special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten in the forenoon and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the 76th section of the Act, the Judges of the aforesaid districts respectively shall take charge of the certificate or return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of the Inspectors on each district, at the Court House in the Borough of Tunkhannock, on the third day after the day of election, being the 16th day of October next, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said Judges. Also that where a Judge by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or Clerks of election of said district, who shall do and perform the duties required by said Judge when so taken charge of.

Also, that in the 31st section of said Act, it is enacted, that when two or more counties shall compose a district for the choice of a member or members of the Senate of the United States or of the House of Representatives of the United States or of the Commonwealth, or President Judge, the Judges of election in each county having met as aforesaid, the Clerks shall make out a fair statement of all the votes which shall have been given at such election, within the county for every person voted for, as such member or members of the Senate, or President Judge, which shall be signed by said Judges and attested by the Clerks; and one of the said Judges shall take charge of said certificate and shall produce the same at a meeting of one Judge from each county in such districts as is meeting shall be held the seventh day after the election.
