Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is fereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections, are hereby, hereafter, authorized and required fo vote, by tickets, printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, sever-ally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace ally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for, and to be labelled, outside, "judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all state officers voted for, and to be labelled, "state;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of senator, member, and members of assembly, if roted for, and members of congress if voted for, and be labelled, "county;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers voted for, and be labelled, "township;" one ticket ted for, and be labelled, "township;" one ticket shall embrace the rames of all borough officers voted for, and be labelled, "borough;" and each class

shall be deposited in separate ballot-boxes. AND WHEREAS, By the act of the Congress of the AND WHEREAS, By the act of the Congress of the United States, ensitled "An act to amend the several acts heretofore passed to provide for the enrolling and calling out the National forces, and for other purposes" and approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, all persons who have deserted the military or naval service of the United States and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty, or disability therein provided are feemed, and taken, to have voluntarily relinquished, and forfeited their rights of citizenship, and their right to become citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens

AND WHEREAS, Persons, not citizens of the United States, are not, under the Constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Common wealth

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and
House of Representatives of the Commenwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in all elections hereafter to be held in this C min all elections hereafter to be need in this C im-monwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or in-spectors of any such election to receive ballot, or ballots, from any person or persons embraced ir the provisions, and subject to the disability, im-posed by said act of Congress, approved March third.

one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to rote any ballot, or ballots,

Section 2. That if any such judge and inspectors of election, or any one of them shall receive or consent to receive, any such unlawful ballot, or ballots, from any such disqualified person, he, or they, so offending shall be guilty of a misdementor, and, upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, he shall, for each offense, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprison-ment, in the jail f the proper county, for not less than sixty days

Sec 3. That if any person deprived of citizen-ship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall at any elec-tion, hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth. vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote, a ballot, or ballots, any person, so offending, shall be deemed guilty of a mislemeanor, and on consistion thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall, for each ofiense, be punished in like manner as is provided in the preceeding section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful batlot or ballots SEC. 4 That if any person shall persuady, or advise, any person, or persons, de prived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, to offer say ballot or ballots, to the officers of any election, herelot or ballots, to the officers of any election, hereafter to be hell is this Commonwealth, or shall persuade, or advise, any such officer to receive any ballot, or ballots, from any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, such person, so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeaner, and upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall be punished in like manner as is provided in the se one section of this act, in the case of officers of such election receiving such unlawful ballot, or ballots

Agreeably to the provisions of the sixty-first sec tion of said Act, every general and special election shill be opened between the hours of eight and ten in the forenoon and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the even-

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the 76th section of the Act, the Judges of the aforesaid districts respectively shall take charge of the certifi-cate or return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one Judge from e.ch district, at the Court House in the lo-rough of Tunkhannock, on he third day after the day of election, being the 12th day of Octo er next, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said Judges. Also, that where a Judge by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges then the certificates on return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the inspectors or Clerks of election of said district who shall do and perform the duties requir-

ed of said Judge unable to attend.

Also, that in the 31st section of said Act, it is enacted, that when two or more counties shall comenacted that when two or more counters shall com-pose a District for the choice of a member or mem-bers of the senate of this Commonwealth of the House of R presentatives of the United States of this Commonwealth, or President Judge, the Judges of the election in each county having met as aforesaid, the Clerks shall make out a fast statement of all the votes which shall have been given at such election, within the county for every person voted for, as such member or members, or President Judge, which shall be signed by said Judges and attested by the Clerks; and one of the said Judges shall take charge of said certificate and shall pro duce the same at a meeting of one Judge from each county in such districts as is or may be appointed by law for this purpose, which meeting shall be held the seventh day after the election.
