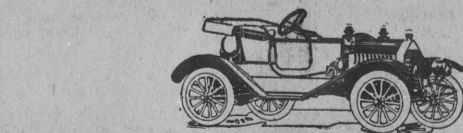

EARLY SPRAYING FOR THE APPLE APHIS.

A prominent nurseryman of Pennsylvania sent two infested apple twigs to State Zoologist H. A. Surface, at Harrisburg, and received the following reply concerning the Apple Aphid, which is a pest that has been one of the very destructive insects in the apple orchards of Eastern America during the past five years:

"The specimen of apple twig sent by you is infested with the eggs of the Apple Aphid. I discussed this subject with some care at the recent meeting of the State Horticultural Association at Harrisburg. There seems to be a general idea that lime-sulfur spraying when dormant does destroy these eggs, but I have found that they can be killed with the dormant spray if directions are followed. In fact, about a dozen persons at the meeting testified that they had controlled the Apple Aphid by the lime-sulfur spray, while a few others had not done so.

"The element of success in spraying for this particular pest is in getting the material on them at the right time, or in waiting until the buds are bursting and spraying after the green leaves appear. I have sprayed when the leaves were one-half inch in length and, of course, before they expanded. But by the time the green leaves are peeping out of the buds one-fourth inch the Aphid eggs have hatched, and the young Aphids have crawled to them and commenced to feed. Spray them with the regular lime-sulfur solution, the same as for San Jose scale and you will destroy them. That is also a good time to add two or three pounds of arsenate of lead to fifty gallons of the lime-sulfur solution to kill the Bud moth, if any are present in the orchard.

I am of the opinion that spraying while the buds remain perfectly dormant may not kill them. There is no reason why one should not increase the strength of the spray liquid to the specific gravity of 1.04 for the eggs of the Apple Aphid. If they are not killed by the dormant spray they cause the leaves to curl and stunt the growth of leaves, twig and fruit, and cause considerable damage, unless after you will spray them with a strong tobacco decoction. This is the best material to use after the leaves have expanded, but it really should not be necessary to use it, as the strong lime-sulfur solution applied when the buds are bursting, or immediately thereafter, also destroys many other species of insects, as well as Mites causing the Blister Mite trouble of leaf and fruit of apple and pear, and also disease germs of various kinds, especially the one causing the Peach leaf curl."
