CONSTABLES REPORT POOR ROADS.

Z. H. Heinbaugh, constable of Upper Turkeyfoot township, and John Spangler, constable of Milford township have returned the road supervisors of their balliwicks to court for alleged negligence of the public highways. Both returns complain of one road, leading from Casselman to Rockwood, part of which is located in Upper Turkeyfoot twp. and part in Milford twp.

It is alleged that the general condition of the roads bad on account of lack of needed repairs and that in some places the highway has been in an almost impassable condition for five or six months.

The Upper Turkeyfoot twp., supervisors are J. C. McMillen, E. S. Seohler and Wm. Nicklow. The accused supervisors of Milford twp., are Mahlon Saylor, Charles G. Seehler and Norman Saylor.

The constables, return have been docketed for trial at September court being treated the same as cases in which sworn informants are made.
