ROUTE ANNOUNCED.**
Mr. T. W. Gurley, received the
official announcement and posters of
the Lincoln Highway, from coast
to coast. It came too late for last
week's paper.

Starting in New York City, the
highway passes through Jersey City,
Newark and Trenton to Philadelphia,
then west to Pittsburgh, through the
north central section of Ohio, over to
Fort Wayne and South Bend, skirts
Chicago, enters Joliet, Rochelle, Ster-
ling and other Illinois cities, reaches
Iowa at Clinton and leaves at Coun-
cil Bluffs, passes through Omaha,
goes to Denver, and north to Chey-
enne, west through Green river and
Evanston to Salt Lake City, finds
its way into Nevada by way of Tip-
pets ranch and after reaching Reno,
goes to Lake Tahoe, Cal., finally
ending on the Pacific seaboard at
Oakland and San Francisco.
