Judge W. Rushe Gillan, of Chambersburg, is assisting Judge Ruppel in civil court this week. The Franklin county jurist is presiding at the trial of the ejection suit of S. D. Livengood's assignee against J. C. Reed, in which title to a house and lot in Meyersdale is involved. Judge Ruppel is also hearing a Meyersdale case, in which Frank Bankiski sues G. W. Logue, a hotel proprietor for \$5,000 damages for injuries sustained when he fell down a stairway in the defendant's hotel. Bankiski claims that while he was a guest at the defendant's house he was unable to see the stairway leading out of a hall on account of lack of illumination. The plaintiff alleges that among other injuries suffered was a broken leg.
