#### OLD COMMISSIONERS "COUGH UP" \$3665.34.

Former County Commissioners Josiah Specht and Charles F. Zimmerman Tuesday returned to the County Treasury \$1,221.78 each, with which amounts they were surcharged by the Board of County Auditors in 1909.

The Auditors contended that the County Commissioners illegally paid out \$3,865.34 in the construction of out \$3,000.34 in the constitute of the county bridges. It was alleged that the County was charged for masonry, etc., that was never built, and the Auditors produced measurements to substantiate their assertions.

The Commissioners appealed the surcharge to court but lost out. Later an appeal was taken to the Supreme Court, with the same result, and the
