\$500 REWARD FOR ABSCONDING ATTORNEY

The Somerset County Telephone company, largely owned by Johnstown parties, has posted a reward of \$500 for the arrest of Attorney Harvey M. Berkeley, former secretary of that concern, who disappeared from his home in Somerset on August 21, 1913, after it had been discovered that many fraudulent shares of stock of the telephone company had been issued by him and used as collateral for loans, said to aggregate anywhere from \$60,000 to \$100,000.

The posters offering the reward bear a picture of the missing attorney and gives the following description: "Age 33; height, 5 feet 7 1/2 inches, weight, 180 pounds; wears mustache, has prominent teeth, one filled with gold; has large, protruding ankles inside each foot; has straight black hair, tinged with gray and thin."

From time to time since Berkeley disappeared rumors have been circulated that he was seen at various places, including Cleveland, O., and New York city, by persons who recognized him.

It is thought that the creditors will agree to settle with the surety company, of Scranton, Pa., on a basis which will secure for the creditors a portion of the money Berkeley is alleged to have embezzled.
