

BIG STATES GO REPUBLICAN

Results of the Election in Many States Shown

WERE NUMEROUS SURPRISES

Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey Desert Democracy.

The result of the election was a sweeping victory for the Republicans in the country as a whole and in such states as Pennsylvania and New York especially.

Prohibition was defeated in Ohio and California.

Pennington led the way for sweeping House gains.

The results in the different states are as follows:

Alabama—U. S. Senator, Oscar W. Underwood, Democrat; Governor, Charles S. Henderson, Democrat.

Arizona—U. S. Senator, Marcus A. Smith, Democrat; Governor, George W. Hunt, Democrat.

Arkansas—U. S. Senator, James P. Clark, Democrat; Governor, George W. Hays, Democrat.

California—The race for United States Senator is still in doubt.

Delaware—T. W. Miller, Republican, was elected as Delaware's only representative in Congress.

Florida—Duncan U. Fletcher, Democrat, was elected U. S. Senator.

Georgia—U. S. Senator, Hoke Smith, Democrat; Governor, N. E. Harris, Democrat.

Idaho—U. S. Senator, James H. Brady, Republican.

Illinois—U. S. Senator, Lawrence Y. Sherman, Republican; former Speaker Joseph G. Cannon was elected to Congress.

Iowa—U. S. Senator, Albert B. Cummings, Republican; Governor, George W. Clarke, Republican.

Kansas—U. S. Senator, Charles Curtis, Republican; Governor, Arthur Capper, Republican.

Kentucky—U. S. Senator, J. C. W. Beckham, Democrat; Johnson N. Camden, Democrat, was elected for the remainder of the late Senator W. O. Bradley's term.

Louisiana—U. S. Senator, B. F. Bousard, Democrat. All the other Democratic candidates in Louisiana were elected.

Maryland—U. S. Senator, John Walter Smith, Democrat. Five Democrats and one Republican were elected representative in Congress.

Missouri—U. S. Senator, William J. Rone, Democrat. Woman Suffrage was defeated.

Massachusetts—Governor, David I. Walsh, Democrat. Republicans added three more members to Congress.

Michigan—Governor, W. N. Ferris, Democrat.

Minnesota—Governor, W. S. Hammond, Democrat.

New Hampshire—U. S. Senator, James H. Gallinger, Republican; Governor, R. H. Spaulding, Republican.

Nebraska—Governor, John H. Morehead, Democrat.

Nevada—U. S. Senator, Francis G. Newlands, Democrat; Governor, T. L. Oddie, Republican.

New Jersey—Democrats will retain control of the State Senate by a vote of 11 to 10 and the Assembly will be Republican by about 33 to 2.

New York—U. S. Senator, James M. Wadsworth, Jr., Republican; Governor, Charles S. Whitman, Republican.

Ohio—U. S. Senator, Warren G. Harding, Republican; Governor, Frank

West Virginia—The Republicans have elected Howard Sutherland for Congress-at-Large, Hunter H. Moss for the Fourth district and Edward Cooper in the Fifth. The Democrats have elected three Congressmen also, gaining one. Those elected are M. M. Neely, in the First district; Junior Brown, in the Second, and Adam Lithepaugh in the Third.

Wisconsin—The race for U. S. Senator is very close between McGovern, Republican, and Hustings, Democrat.

Washington—U. S. Senator, Wesley L. Jones, Republican.

Wyoming—Governor, J. B. Kendrick, Democrat and Progressive.

SUFFRAGE STATES NUMBER TEN

Chicago, Ill.—Women now have full suffrage in ten states and in the territory of Alaska, according to latest returns, which apparently gave the franchise to women in Nevada and Montana.

The ten female suffrage states with the time of granting the franchise are: Wyoming, 1890; Colorado, 1893; Utah, 1896; Washington, 1910; California, 1912; Arizona, 1912; Kansas, 1912; Oregon, 1912; Nevada, 1914; Montana, 1914.

The 22 states allowing partial suffrage to women are: Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Iowa, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Ohio (defeated full suffrage in 1912 and on Tuesday); South Dakota, Vermont and Wisconsin.

VILLA HOLDS GUTIERREZ

Carranza Agency Reports New President of Mexico is Imprisoned.

New York.—General Eulalio Gutierrez, who was elected President of Mexico by the Aguascalientes convention, has been imprisoned by General Francisco Villa, according to a telegram said to come from General Venustiano Carranza and made public here by the Mexican bureau of information, the same agency that announced Gutierrez had repudiated the acts of the convention electing him. The telegram did not say where the new President had been captured or where he was believed to be incarcerated. The reason for the seizure and confinement of Gutierrez, the message said, was that he had refused to be dominated by the demands of the Villa faction.

BIG FIRE LOSS

West Brownsville Nearly Destroyed by Flames Doing \$250,000 Damage.

Brownsville, Pa.—Ten persons seriously injured, more than a score of others painfully burned and bruised, hundreds of people made homeless and damage estimated at \$250,000, resulted from the most disastrous fire in the history of this section, and nearly destroyed the town of West Brownsville, across the Monongahela river from here. A quart of gasoline, being used to clean a suit of clothes in the West Brownsville Dyeing and Cleaning Company's plant, in the basement of the Hotel Aubrey, igniting from an unknown source, started the conflagration. A tank filled with 150 gallons of gasoline exploded shortly after the start of the fire and hurled its fiery contents all over the town, scattering destruction in every direction and injuring dozens of spectators.

Commission Suspends Freight Rate.

Washington, D. C.—Proposed increases in freight rates on a large cement traffic, varying from 10 to 54 cents a ton, from factories in Eastern Pennsylvania to destinations in Virginia and West Virginia, were suspended by the Interstate Commerce Commission until March 10, for inquiry.

Kronland Released.

Washington, D. C.—The American steamer Kronland has been released by the British officers at Gibraltar and sailed, leaving the copper and rubber of her cargo for a verdict of a prize court. The incident explained the distinction the British government has made between "seizing" and "detaining" a vessel. The Kronland, it has developed, was merely detained and asked to discharge her cargo for the determination of the question of ultimate destination.

WHOLE REPUBLICAN TICKET WAS ELECTED

The Pluralities of the State Candidates Were of Six Figure Proportions

Philadelphia.—The entire State Republican ticket was elected in Pennsylvania, Penrose and Brumbaugh both have a big majority.

Penrose's plurality for re-election to the United States Senate probably will be more than 250,000. Returns received so far give him a plurality of 243,647 over Gifford Pinchot, who has a lead of 4,155 votes over A. Mitchell Palmer, the Democratic candidate. The total vote so far received for the three candidates aggregates 1,046,126, divided as follows:

Penrose, 512,525; Pinchot, 268,878; Palmer, 264,723.

Martin G. Brumbaugh's plurality over Vance C. McCormick on the returns so far received is 139,061. The total vote for these two candidates up to date is 1,022,341, divided as follows:

Brumbaugh, 580,701; McCormick, 441,640.

Judge Frank M. Trexler, the appointee of Governor Tener to the Superior Court, was elected by a big majority over James E. Clark on the Non-partisan ticket.

Returns in Pennsylvania have reduced the plurality of Robert S. Frazer of Pittsburgh, candidate for Supreme Court judge on the non-partisan ballot over George Kunkel of Harrisburg to 9,088. The total vote so far received is as follows:

Frazer, 377,982; Kunkel, 368,894.

13 STATES HAVE PROHIBITION

Chicago, Ill.—Thirteen states now have laws prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages.

The states which prohibit the sale of liquor are: Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Kansas, Maine, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oregon, Tennessee, Washington, West Virginia and North Dakota.

Alabama at one time adopted a prohibition amendment but later rescinded it. The part of Oklahoma that was formerly Indian Territory is also prohibition and South Carolina is largely so under various acts. A score of states has local option laws.

U. S. Treasury Report.

Washington, D. C.—The condition of the United States treasury at the beginning of business was: Net balance in general fund, \$85,679,900; total receipts, \$1,445,557; total payments, \$2,938,431; the deficit this fiscal year is \$47,132,481, against a deficit of \$7,573,938 last year, exclusive of Panama canal and public debt transactions.

Hayti Elects Rebel Leader President.

Port-Au-Prince, Hayti.—Davilmar Theodore, the leader of the recent successful rebellion against the administration of President Zamor, was elected president of the Haitian republic by congress.

Earth Shakes in California.

Chico, Cal.—Two distinct earthquake shocks, 15 seconds apart, were felt at the town of Vina, 20 miles north of here, their general direction being from east to west.

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
