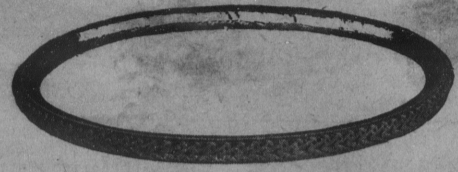

SALISBURY.

An epidemic of scarlet fever has broken out and the local Health authorities with the cooperation of Dr. Large, are doing their utmost to prevent further spread of the disease. So far six cases have been reported in four different families. If many more cases develop the schools which are scheduled to close on Friday December 18th for a week's vacation, may be closed by the Board of Directors before that time. It will be well for all citizens to use all precautionary measure to prevent a real epidemic to spring from the cases already announced. To many people instead of reporting promptly to the proper authorities or to call a physician at times like this when they have sickness do nothing in order to prevent quarantine and thereby not only jeopardize the health and welfare of their own families but do a great injustice to others and also make themselves liable to heavy fines as prescribed by the laws of the state. Some knowingly violate the quarantine which also makes them liable to fine or imprisonment or both.

Miss Violet James, who has an attack of scarlet fever and was thought to be improving, was last Sunday reported to be in a critical condition as complications have set in. Miss James was suffering from a nervous breakdown before she contracted the fever. She was a clerk in Meagher's store before her illness and her many friends miss her ever pleasant countenance. Her father, George James, manager of the Meagher store, is endeavoring to move his abiding place from the store and he and his wife, after complying with Health Department requirements, will stay with the Howard Meagher family until the quarantine is lifted. A later report is that Miss James is improving.
