PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS FOR R. R. EMPLOYEES.
Announcement is made that the
officials of the Baltimore & Ohio
railroad have in mind the adoption of
a rule requiring physical examina-
tion of all applicants seeking employ-
ment. The requirements are to be
similar to those enacted by the
government of applicants for service
with the United States. Medical ex-
amination are already required by
many railroads especially in the case
of engineers who are obliged to un-
dergo tests for their sight while all
employees in dining car or restaurant
service must submit to physical ex-
aminations regularly. The Balti-
more & Ohio, however, proposes to
extend the plan to all employees, even
in clerical and other sedentary occu-
pations.

Several tracts of mineral land re-
main to be sold of the S. D. Liven-
good estate for creditors of the de-
funct Farmers' Bank, of Meyersdale.
It is thought the mineral land will
bring approximately \$20,000. If
such a figure can be obtained, the as-
signee will be enabled to pay another
dividend of ten per cent, which
would bring the total dividends up to
37 per cent. Livengood's liabilities
were \$200,000.

Options were recently secured on
a plot of mineral land in Milford
township, near Rockwood. There are
1,500 acres of coal involved. A num-
ber of prominent coal operators are
interested in the prospective deal.
Farms under option are those of
George J. Hay, John M. Critchfield,
Herman Hay, Walker Brothers, Alex-
ander Newman, E. J. Welmer, Jacob
Walter, John C. Weller and others.
The farmers have been almost de-
seised by prospectors and promoters
but are very wary of all such.

RULING ON AUTO FEES.

Automobile license fees collected
by the state highway department may
be spent by that department for the
maintenance of roads in the state, ac-
cording to a decision which was han-
ded down Monday by the supreme
court in Philadelphia by Justice Pot-
ter.

The court by the decision, upholds
the Dauphin County court which a-
warded a mandamus against Auditor
General Powell and State Treasurer
Young commanding them to pay cer-
tain road bills of former Highway
Commissioner Bigelow of funds re-
ceived from automobile registrations
and licenses. The fees received since
the passage of the motor license law
total more than \$1,000,000.

Auditor General Powell and State
Treasurer Young appealed from the
decision of the Dauphin County court
attacking the constitutionality of the
automobile license act.

It was agreed by Attorney General
John C. Bell that the legislature had
a right to determine how fees receiv-
ed under the act should be spent, and
that it was the duty of the auditor
general after examining the bills and
deciding upon their correctness, to is-
sue a warrant upon the state treas-
urer, who was simply the custodian
of the money and had no further pow-
ers. The supreme court upheld that
argument.

ON FILING JUDGMENTS.

Attorneys of the Somerset county
bar as well as laymen who file judg-
ments of record with Prothonotary A.
F. Heiple in the future will be
required to fill out the tiny blank
bearing their signature and exact
residence address of the filer which
will be pasted to the instrument.

By provision of a recent act of assem-
bly this form is required in order that
an exact record of the one who
presents the paper may follow the
document itself. The purpose primari-
ly is to keep accurate tabs on the
number of instruments recorded in
order that the payment of the neces-
sary 4-mill tax cannot be avoided or
neglected.

INVESTIGATION

SHOULD BE MADE.
A jury rendered a verdict to the
effect that James Marino, who died
a few days ago in a Johnstown
hospital, was the victim of a gunshot
wound, thus putting the matter up to
the Somerset county authorities to
determine the manner in which the
injury was inflicted. When brought to
the hospital from Acosta, Marino told
the attendants he had attempted to
prevent his brother-in-law from com-
mitting suicide and in the struggle for
the weapon the revolver was accident-
ally discharged. A verdict of accident
was rendered in the investigation
into the death of Joseph Sorrodo, a
Jenners miner who was brought to the
City hospital for treatment.
