

NEWS IN GENERAL.

Roumania is now anxious to join the allies against Germany. Orders have been given to fire 800 new ovens at plants of the H. C. Frick Co. in the Pittsburg district.

Mobs in Berlin, Germany, are becoming clamorous for peace and complaining of the high cost of living. The Telegraaf of Amsterdam says according to German casualty lists, Prussian losses alone, have reached 1,338,000.

Spurred on by a great public demand for a better national defense, Congress at its next session will be forced to make up for years of neglect by passing a naval budget that will in all probability exceed previous naval budgets by many millions of dollars. The ships and men that should have been provided in the last five years will be demanded and Congress will provide them.

Establishment of 710 new rural mail delivery routes to serve 82,390 families is announced by Postmaster General Burleson. Nearly all of the new routes will go into effect on June 15. Postmasters have been authorized to appoint the necessary additional carriers until civil service examinations can be held.

The bill placing a 2-1/2 per cent ad valorem tax on anthracite coal has been approved by Governor Brumbaugh. The new coal law takes the place of the act passed by the 1913 legislature, the constitutionality of which is now in the state supreme court. The act is expected to raise about \$4,500,000 in the next two years half of which is to go to the state for road improvements and the other half is to be returned to the counties in which the coal is produced.

Gov. Brumbaugh Monday night announced his approval of the sixth workman's compensation act. The act formed one of the big pieces of legislation of the session just closed. They established complete system of workman's compensation and a state insurance fund with a proposed constitutional amendment to make compensation compulsory. The governor earlier in the day signed the two bills to bring the anthracite and bituminous miners of the state under the compensation system. The system will take effect next January.

All of the 25,000 Italian reservists in Western Pennsylvania will at once be notified to hold themselves in readiness for service in their country's army. The Italian ambassador in Washington has notified Jos. Natali, Italian vice consul in Pittsburg to get into touch with all able-bodied reservists between the ages of 20 and 39 years. These men have received a full military training; there are about 8,000 of them in Pittsburg. The call invited attention to an Italian law which holds all persons of Italian birth subject to the call to arms regardless whether they have become citizens of another country or not. The penalty for refusal to obey the call is imprisonment in event of a later return to Italy.

For Clothes Moth.

A prominent lady in the enterprising county seat of Cumberland county wrote to State Zoologist H. A. Surface, asking, "If I put my furs and winter clothes in a room, and burn several formaldehyde lamps in the room will they kill any moth eggs that may happen to be on the garments? How can I best protect such articles from damage by such pests?" To these inquiries Prof. Surface replied as follows:

"I can say that formaldehyde lamps or candles burned in a room for the purpose of killing the clothes moths in their egg or larva stages will not bring the desired results.

"Formaldehyde is a good germicide but is not an insecticide. Insects cannot be killed by the methods that are employed by persons doing sanitary household fumigation, according to the directions or methods of a health officer. The method of fumigation recommended by a physician may be all right for killing disease germs but is worthless for destroying insects. The material is not the same and the results will not be satisfactory.

"Another good method is simply to brush the clothing well or whip it hard in the sunshine; air it well, and then put it away in good paper or tight cloth sacks that are tied tightly. It is important in storing woolen goods or articles of fur or feathers for the summer to be sure they are stored away tightly, and the moths cannot get in them. Where they are put in boxes, strips of paper should be pasted over cracks both inside and outside. If there are put into paper sacks they should be bound and tied tightly. A double tying is liable to be quite beneficial.

"Moth balls are useful only for the purpose of helping to prevent the entrance of such pests. It should be remembered that they do not kill the pests if they are present. Really tight sealing of receptacles or tight tying of good paper bags is more effective against the protection of clothing from moths than are the foul smelling moth balls. Of course, with this precaution it is necessary to be sure

BOUNTIES DIRECT TO

CLAIMANTS.

Our attention has just been directed to a condition relating to the payment of bounties that calls for immediate action upon the part of this office if trouble and loss to certain parties are to be avoided. I refer to the practice heretofore followed by justices and others in this commonwealth of advancing to claimants for bounties the amounts that may be set forth in their probate, or of buying such claims at a discount and collecting the face value of the claim from those directed to pay same.

The act of April 15, 1915, relating to the payment of bounties, provides that the bounties paid under its provisions shall be paid in a prescribed way by check from the state treasurer to the person killing the animal as named in the affidavit forwarded to this office. To attempt to forward checks to other persons is not authorized by law and for us to attempt to keep track of those who might buy up claims of this kind would require a special line of bookkeeping in this office, which for various reasons cannot be attempted.

For these reasons those who have in the past been in the habit of advancing money to bounty claimants are warned not to continue this practice, as no claim will be certified by this office to the auditor general except in the name of the party making the affidavit to the killing.

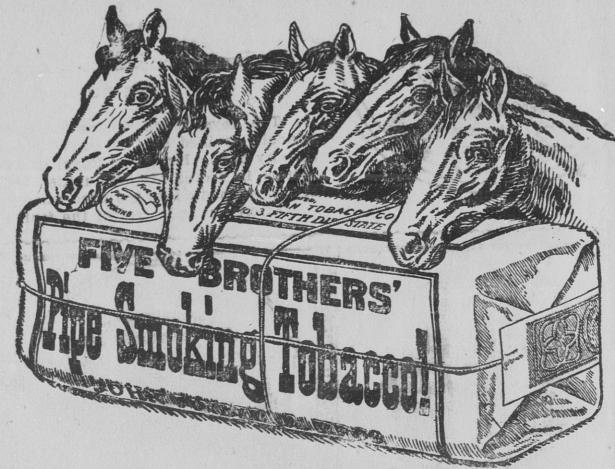

ed so fortunately.

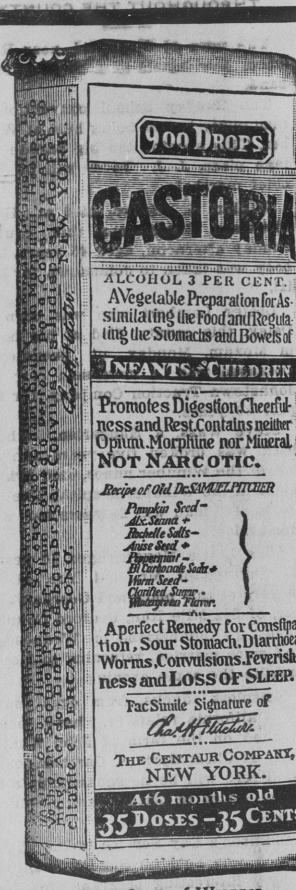

RELATIVES MUST

PAY FOR INSANE.

With the signing of the Whitaker House bill Friday, by the Governor, legal machinery was provided for compelling relatives or trustees of an insane person's estate to pay in whole or in part for the maintenance of such an insane patient committed to a state institution. It is expected that the Attorney General will immediately start proceedings to compel such payment, collecting large sums due the Commonwealth for past and present treatment of hundreds of insane. The Auditor General has figured out that the new measure ought to save the state 100,000 annually.
