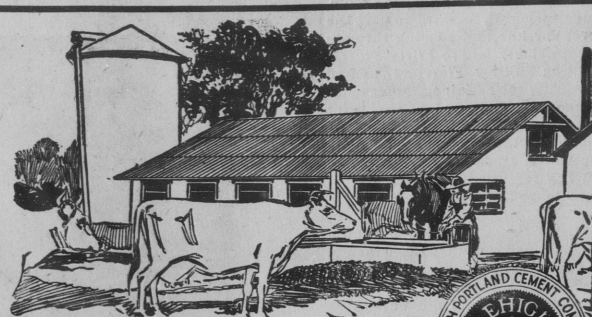
Miss Annie Wylie who had been visiting her sister Mrs. George Wagner returned to her home in Garrett Co., Md., one day last week.

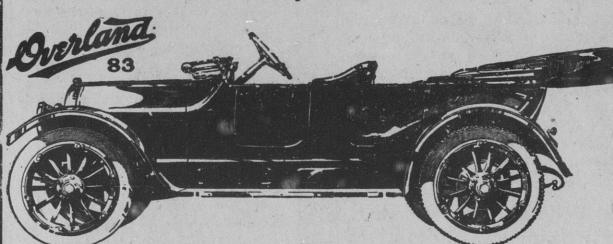

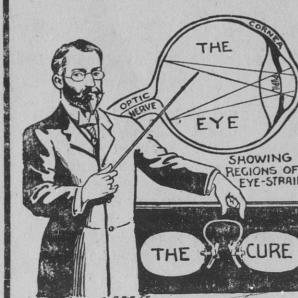
