

NEWS IN GENERAL.

The Baltimore & Ohio Veteran Employees' Association will have their annual outing at Berkeley Springs, W. Va., August 12.

Ernestine Moore, 21, of Pittsburg joyfully telephoned her mother that she escaped injury in an automobile accident and two hours later she was drowned when a canoe upset.

Resolutions demanding that all church workers unite to procure saloonless United States of America and also peace in Europe were adopted by the World's Christian Endeavor Convention at its final session in Chicago on Monday night. Representatives of 14 foreign countries, including delegates from five of the warring world powers, expounded Christianity and world peace from the same platform.

A patent medicine caused the death of 2-month-old Joseph Dann, son of Joseph Dann, of Youngstown, Ohio, according to the verdict of the coroner. The mother went to a drug store intending to call a physician for the child, when the clerk recommended the medicine. An overdose of the remedy, which contained morphine sulphate, caused the child's death, the coroner stated.

The holdings of J. V. Thompson, of Uniontown, are valued at \$65,367,758, according to the voluminous report filed with the court at Uniontown, Monday by appraisers named by the court to estimate the value of the millionaire coal man's holdings, following the receivership appointed upon the closing of the First National Bank of Uniontown, some months ago.

On Thursday night Germany's reply to the American note regarding the sinking of the Lusitania and submarine warfare was delivered to James W. Gerard, the American ambassador. There was first reiterated assurance that American ships engaged in legitimate trade, will not be interfered with nor the lives of Americans upon neutral ships be endangered; second, that German submarines will be instructed to allow American passenger ships to pass freely and safely, Germany entertaining in return the confident hope that the American government will see that these ships do not carry contraband; such ships to be provided with distinguishing marks and their arrival announced a reasonable time in advance. The same privilege will be extended to a reasonable number of passenger ships. The reply is considered as very unsatisfactory but there is little danger of a rupture between the two nations.

DO YOU WANT A FARM?

There are now several hundred farms open to homestead entry about which the homeseeker would do well to investigate. In the arid region the Government has spent a million dollars in irrigation systems. More than 800,000 acres are now receiving water from the Government ditches, and there are still several hundred choice farms awaiting the practical farmer.

These farms are free, but the law requires settlers to pay their share of building the irrigation system, the money to be placed again in the Reclamation fund for the building of their irrigation works; and they must also pay their portion of the operation and maintenance cost. A practical farmer with from \$1,500 to \$3,000 should be able to acquire one of these farms and put it in successful cultivation. Under the existing law settlers are allowed 20 years in which to pay for their water right, and no interest is required on deferred payments. The statistician of the U. S. reclamation service in Washington, D. C., will give you details concerning methods of filing, terms of payment, and location, climate, soil and other data in connection with the various projects.

The farms are located mainly in S. Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Nevada. Rural telephones, centralized graded schools, good transportation facilities, and towns at short intervals, are some of the things that rob life on these new lands of many of the trials of pioneering.

Shipment of the hunters' license tags which are to be worn on the sleeves of hunters when in the field will be made from the State Game Commission offices of the State within a short time so that they can be put on sale early. The hunting season does not begin for anything except snipe before the middle of October. The snipe season opens on September 1.

RALPHTON MAN

ROBBED OF \$147.  
Officers have telephoned to nearby towns descriptions of John McFall and James Murphy, who are wanted in connection with the theft of \$147 in paper money from the home of Fred Gill, of Ralphton, Master Mechanic at No. 5 Mine.

Verna Gill, aged 11 years, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gill, says she surprised her uncle, John McFall, as he was searching in a wardrobe in the upstairs of their home Thursday morning between nine and ten o'clock. McFall told her he was looking for a pin and then left the house. Mrs. Gill who was in another part of the house and did not know of McFall's presence, hurried to the room, finding an empty pocketbook on the floor and \$147 that it had contained missing. McFall had entered the house in daylight and slipped unnoticed to the second floor.

McFall and Murphy had been loafing about Ralphton for about a week, but they have not since been seen about there since the robbery. McFall is described as being five feet six inches tall with dark complexion. Murphy is two inches taller and of light complexion. Both men wore dark suits and light caps. They are 21 years of age and were smooth shaven.
