The ice box is a necessity in hot climates for the preservation of milk and meat. Where there are infants and young children in the family the proper care of the milk requires ice order that it may be kept at a sufficiently low temperature to prevent it from becoming a poison.

For the proper care of food during the hot weather cleanliness of the the vessels and ice box is essential The box should be cleansed thorough ly at frequent and regular intervals The interior should be washed first with cold water and soap and then rinsed with scalding water. The drainage pipes should be kept free from slime. When a rubber tube is used to carry off the waste water, this can be boiled without damaging

The ice itself should be thoroughly washed always before it is put into the box. Unless there is absolute certainty that the ice is made from filtered water or obtained from a source free of sewage pollution it should not be placed directly on food or in the drinking water.

Economy and health will both be served by placing the drinking wat er in a receptacle next to the ice. This as is healthful. Iced drinks interfere with digestion and are a menace t health. They often arrest digestion and not infrequently produce death Red meats should never be frozen of

Scrupulous cleanliness will be re paid by the saving in food stuffs and the maintaining of their quality.


