J. A. Beachy and L. H. Griffith were in Hayes and vicinity buying up horses this week.

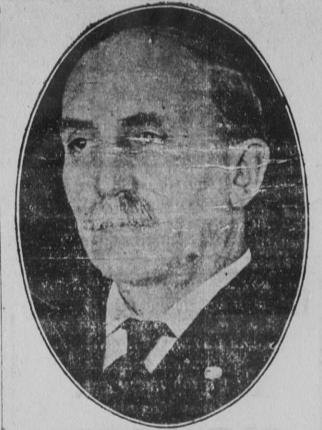
Mr. and Mrs. Howard Ringer spent a few days in Bittinger with Mr. and Mrs. Perry Broadwater, recently.

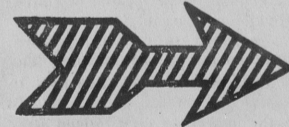
