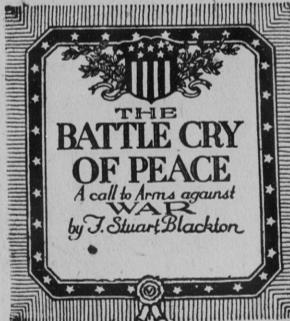

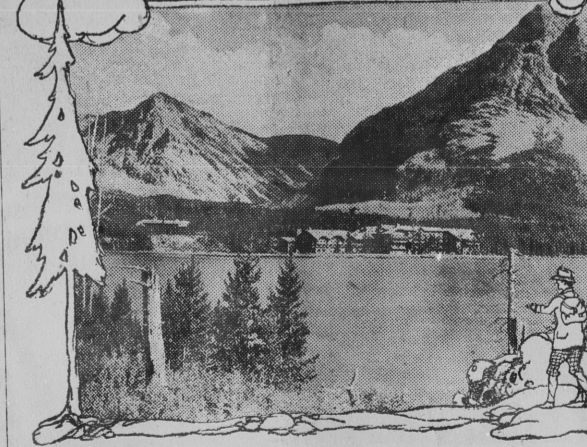
In these scenes you will see the real west—wild but never "woolly" in all its wondrous charm.
