OPEN LETTER ON RIGHT TO TRAIN DOGS

My dear Sir:—I write you this open letter today, and as it may be a matter of considerable interest to some of your readers, I hope you may publish same without charge.

We are frequently in receipt of inquiries at this time relative to the right of those who may own dogs to turn them loose to run as they please at this time of the year. Some of these inquiries come from the owners of dogs, and some from those who are opposed to dogs, and for the benefit of both, I quote the Law in so far as game is concerned, a part of Section 21 of the Act of May 1st, 1909, as amended by the Act of April 15th, 1915, P. L. 133, which reads as follows: "Provided, That dogs, when accompanied by and under control of their masters, may be trained upon any of the living wild game or birds of the first day of September to the first day of March next following, so long as no injury is inflicted upon said animals or birds."

The dog must be with his master and must be under the control of such master, and the game pursued must not be injured. Dogs cannot be turned out to run at large, under penalty of death of the dog at the hands of a Game Protector, when such dog is caught pursuing game or injuring game in violation of this provision. Under the provisions of the Act of June 3rd, 1915, P. L. 791, dogs even under control of their masters may be killed at any time by the owner of lands upon which such dog may be found, or by the employe of such owner, unless the dog shall have attached to his collar the tax tag described by the Act, and the owner shall have no recourse at Law in either case.

CAN PRESERVE EGGS WITH WATER GLASS

It is during the spring of the year when eggs are plentiful that they should be "put down" or preserved for winter use. Water glass has been found to be the best means of preservation.

Only fresh, clean eggs should be used and they should never be washed. Crocks, jars, and galvanized iron or wooden vessels may be used. Crocks, however, are considered best. Any vessel used should be clean and sweet and wooden vessels should be thoroughly scalded before eggs are packed in them.

The liquid rather than the powdered form of water glass is preferable. The home economics extension department of the Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture and Experiment Station recommends using one part of the liquid water glass to ten parts of water. It is advisable to boil the water. When the solution has cooled the eggs should be placed in as they are gathered and the vessel containing eggs and solution stored in a cool place. There should always be one or two inches of solution above the eggs.

The solution made from one quart of water glass will preserve about twelve dozen eggs.

Miss Josephine and Mr. Harry Tedrow of Pittsburgh were called home on account of the illness of their father.

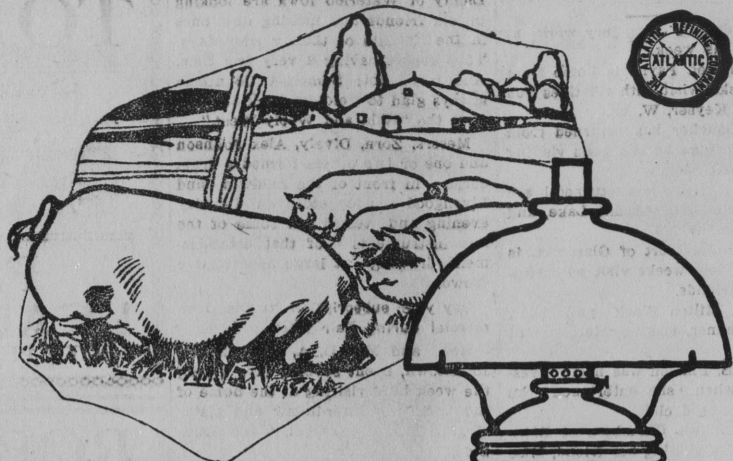
Mr. Israel Gross who has been very ill for several weeks is getting weaker and no hope of his recovery is entertained.

B. & O. TO GUARD AGAINST SPREADING DISEASE

As a means of protecting public health, the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad System has inaugurated an anti-spitting campaign through which it will make a personal appeal to those who patronize its trains and passenger stations to refrain from expectorating in public places.

On a designated day each month this railroad will distribute through the coaches of its trains a small card on which the attention of the public is directed to the danger of spreading disease. Public health and other authorities in the states through which the railroad operates have lent their approval to the campaign, which will give effective co-operation to those who are striving to safeguard the public health.

Trainmen will distribute the cards on the 15th day of the month. Instructions to the train employes and station forces concerning distribution point out that the plan adopted offers an inoffensive and forceful means of directing the attention to the danger of spitting in public and makes it possible for the railroad to lend its assistance in a compliance with the law and promoting situation.

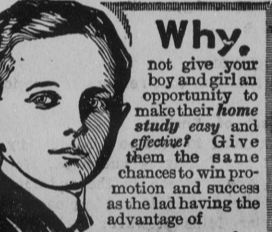
