HISTORY OF SOMERSET CO. BENCH

The Somerset County Bar Association at a meeting held on 28th. Sept. took the step towards securing portraits of the attorneys who have been called to the bench of the county court, and occupants of the bench when Somerset was included in the various districts courts. The action taken Monday was brought about by an offer made by an artist residing at York, Pa. to furnish an oil portrait of the late Jeremiah S. Black. Ex-Judge F. J. Kooser was named as a committee to inspect the portrait and conduct the negotiations. The portrait is a replica of one of Judge Black in the court house at York, and of another recently ordered for the court house of Franklin county at Chambersburg.

Judge Jeremiah S. Black was the first native of Somerset county to secure a seat on the bench of the courts of Pennsylvania. He was subsequently called to fill the chair of a Justice of the Supreme Court bench of the State Attorney General of the United States and to the office of Secretary of State. He is admittedly Somerset county's most distinguished son and many laymen think that the members of the bar have been very recreant to a duty they owe to his distinguished services to nation state and county in not having provided a portrait of him for the local temple of justice many years ago.

URIAS SAYLOR

Urias Saylor is dead; he was born on what is now the Wilmoth farm, just across the river from Meyersdale. He moved to Morrill, Kansas in the spring of 1882. He died on Friday September 29th, of typhoid fever and pneumonia, and was about 66 years of age.


For a number of years he had charge of what is now the Jacob Peck farm. He was the son of Abraham Saylor, who at one time owned both the Wilmoth and the Peck farms. Urias Saylor was married to Mary Susan a daughter of William Beachly of this place. The widow, one son and two daughters mourn the death of husband and father.

Mr. Saylor had seven brothers. Joseph of Waterloo, Iowa; Christian (deceased) of Phoenix, Arizona; Eli as ann Daniel of Morrill Kansas; Albert of Seattle, Washington; and Dr. Norman, of Philadelphia; also three sisters, Katy and Susan; (deceased) and Mary of Morrill, Kansas married to John H.
