Harrisburg, Pa, April—Despite their defeat by three votes in the Legislature last week, women of Pénnsylvania, whose organization was the first to offer its services to Pennsylvania and to the Nation during the war, are again asking for consideration by the Legislative body.

This time, the voters having been denied the right to decide the question in 1920, the women ask the Legislators themselves to grant directly to women, as is in the power of the legislature, the right to vote for the next and all following presidents.
