Agricultural Instructor Mc Kerrow's dairy talks were of the highest merit and value to all who heard him, for he showed, as only a Wisconsin farmer probably could show, the great advantage of dairyfarming over every other branch of husbandry. Mr. McKerrrow said Wisconsin, leading all the other states of leading all the other states of the Union, is producing one-half of the butter and cheese of the United States. This is startling but true, and it carries a lesson to the people of the other states that should create profound interest in the work of dairy extension over the entire country. Next to Wisconsin is New York, in the dairy industry. Pennsylvania has natural advantages superior to both Wisconsin and New York that should make the Keystone State lead all other states in dairying, if only our people would awake to their opportunities. The silo is almost universal in Wisconsin. Its adoption in our State should become as wide-spread Its adoption in our State should become as wide-spread as in Wisconsin. The use of silage for all kinds of livestock must become general throughout the United States. "In Wisconsin." says Mr. McKerrow, "practically all silage, is now made from matured corn, and green, immature silage is a thing of the past."

Lecturer R. A. Hayne, the Ohio Apostle of Alfalfa and Livestock, gave several valuable talks on both these topics. able talks on both these topics. Mr. Hayne avers that every farmer must "come to" alfalfa, or lose his place in the emarch of the progress. Mr. Hayne is also an ardent advocate of sheep husbandry, which he illustrated with a stereopticon

Miss Zella Wigent, the young Indiana woman lecturer, gave a splendid lecture on poultry raising, emphasizing good housing, ventilation, cleanliness and scientific feeding as the prime requirements of the prime requirements of success. Butter-milk, she said, is the cheapest source of pro-tien, the most important and indispensable element in poul-

Miss Wigent also gave a lecture on the fly—the common house fly-warning the far-mers against the dangers of infection from this source.

The latest measures of de fense against the fly aim at his seggregation rather than extermination. The latter may be by this time recognized as an irridescent dream—an impossibility. The "drive" against sibility. The "drive" against the fly in the eastern American cities was so relentless that his cities was so reientless that his ranks were thinned appreciably; but as a concomitant, possibly, came a scourage of infantile paralysis, which the high-brow scientific authorities may by this time attribute to the absence of his flyship, who is one of Noture's indicapachle. may by this time attribute to the absence of his flyship, who is one of Nature's indispensable scavengers. At least he is a scavenger, and any propaganda against the fly must ignore his value as a scavenger; and it is possible the high-brow authorities of hygienic science have conjured up the thought that after all the fly is not an un mitigated nuisance, but, on the contrary, a friend of the human species. At any rate there is an ominous silence in the high sanctum of the learned men of medical research on sense on any vital question of human welfare should dictate the actions even of scientists, the actions even of scientists, and the most ordinary common sense must arouse curiosity as to why the crusade againt the fly was ever launched, by any body.
