ROAD TAXES WASTED.

Lack of Intelligent Supervision Is the Chief Cause. as in cash. He says:

"It is frequently argued that because new steel bridges. In Illinois a little more than one-quarter of the road tax is so spent. Steel bridges are a substantial improvement and would be almost imperative with stone roads. (2) Another considerable part of the taxes is used in renewing wood culverts and the floors of bridges, which expense would be practically the same whether the roads are improved or not. (3) A further sum is spent in improving the drainage, which would be required before good stone roads could be built.
