HIGHWAYS OF CUBA.

Improvements Made Since the American Occupation.

Senor Villalon, secretary of public works, in his annual report shows that during the Spanish regime only 275 kilometers of public roads were built, mostly in Havana province. There are now 440 kilometers in course of construction, 492 kilometers have been surveyed, and 1.347 kilometers are projected. All this has been done in less than two years of American occupation. The estimated cost of all these road improvements is \$13,626,000. The carrying out of the work will be extended over a number of years. An office has been established in each province, with an engineer in charge. In making the plans for a road system the most important localities are considered. The work is necessarily slow owing to the lack of funds. Nevertheless each piece of road construct ed forms part of an entire plan, which will be consummated in time. Thi plan provides for a main trunk road the entire length of the island, with branch roads connecting with the principal coast towns. This will allow with their products without being compelled to have recourse to the railroads and will undoubtedly in time result in a very material reduction in the present high railway tariffs.

Some valuable lands will soon be opened up owing to the roads now being constructed. The secretary of pub lic works is overwhelmed with petitions for the construction of highways Roads will be first built in the districts where the greatest number of people will be benefited.
