The pound nets at Vandyke's fisheries, a quarter of a mile south of where the accident occurred, were lifted Tuesday in the hope that the bodies might have been caught in their southward course, but no trace of them

was found. The fact that neither of the bodies has been discovered tends to strengthen the supposition that the boys went lown clinging to one another and are still clutched in death's embrace.
