AN UNQUESTIONABLE PROCEDURE

The rather remarkable and strategic procedure of some Mt. Carmel people who were determined to force a patient into the Hospital at this place now closed by quarantine called forth a perfect storm of indignation about town Thursday.

As might be inferred no patients will be admitted to the Hospital as long as the quarantine lasts. So that when Dr. Meredith was called up by the Mt. Carmel authorities on Wednesday night and informed that they had a patient for the hospital he peremptorily told them that the man could not be admitted, explaining the reason why.

The patient for whom admission was asked was John Saszewicz (rendered into English as "Savage") a native of Russian Poland, 45 years of age, who went violently insane on Tuesday night last.

In view of his conversation with the Mt. Carmel authorities on Wednesday night Dr. Meredith's surprise Thursday can easily be imagined when he saw a two seated carriage drive up to the Hospital, containing the insane man, "Savage," and four other men.

The party, which contained two members of the board of poor overseers, John A. Bricker and Columbus McBride, were determined to leave the patient at the Hospital, Dr. Meredith, however, stood firm in his position and refused to admit him.

Sometime afterward a strange man was seen about the entrance to the Hospital corridor who was recognized as "Savage," the insane man. Not one of his four attendants, however, were to be seen, suspecting a trick of some sort.

The two members of the Mt. Carmel Poor board and their assistants were soon located. They took the view that as one of the districts which helps to support the Hospital Mt. Carmel township is entitled to room for its insane in the institution, small pox or no small pox.

Trustee H. M. Schoch tried to reason with the men, reminding them that they might have to pay pretty dearly for their folly if they attempted to escape from town, leaving their patient behind.
