It is considered safe to predict that the fire will result in very little loss of time to the employes. It is very fortunate for Danville that the night was a quiet one, there being scarcely a breath of air stirring. Fortunately, too, the kind of paint used upon the mill, while not actually fire proof was of a kind designed to resist

There must be a good many place Exactly how the fire originated is not known. Some are of the opinion that it was caused by the furnace stack, which may have become overheated.

New Machinery to be Installed.

A lot of new machinery, already ordered, will be installed at the Shovel Works in a short time, which will materially increase the product of the plant. Among the new pieces is a press for making the largest size of ed, which ought to be removed. Many coop shovels. Other machinery to be installed will merely duplicate what is already in use. The effect will be to increase the product from 150 dozen shovels per day as at present to probab-
