Owing to the continued stringency in the anthracite supply comparatively little is heard concerning circular prices to be put into livering linen as a "side line." effect by the Reading and the other big anthracite mining companies. When distribution was resumed folwork, President Baer, of the Reading, in announcing the circular put out under date of Oct. 4, stated that those prices would continue until Jan. 1, 1903. Now considerable anxiety is felt by dealers and consumers alike as to the probable action of the company in view of the fact that the independent operators are securing from 50 to 75 per cent. more for their coal than called for by the Reading circular.

A dispatch from Philadelphia, referring to the question of advance, savs:

'Officials of the company have little or nothing to say, and one of them, when asked about it, said : Don't discuss it or agitate it.' It can be said, however, on pretty good authority, that Jan. 1 will pass without the is suing of a new circular, and that the present prices will be continued indefinitely. The sales agents of the Pennsylvania railroad's anthracite companies will meet today to discuss the question of prices.

"The great shortage of anthracite is also likely to bring about a change in the Reading's method of dealing with large consumers. Heretofore the company has been making yearly contracts with such consumers. These contracts were made for a year, subject to interruptions from strikes, car shortage or other matters over ' which the company could exercise no control. Many of these contracts are about expiring, and, while the officials are silent on the subject of renewals, it is known that the company has refused to renew some out-of-town contracts, and if the views of some of the company's sales agents are regarded by the officials there will be no contracts made for the coming year. The argument of those opposed to the renewal of these contracts is that there will be no difficulty in disposing of every pound of anthracite mined during the year, and that every consumer should be required to purchase his coal in the open market. If contracts are made they will probably be for periods less than a year. Th scarcity of fuel is not by any means confined to anthracite, and in this city is presented the unusual condition of bituminous coal retailing at \$2.25 per ton higher than is asked by dealers on Reading tracks for anthracite, or \$9 per ton.
