A VISIT TO THE BATTLEFIELDS

David R. Eckman, Hugh Vastine and Harrison C. Kass, of South Danville, who left last Sunday one week ago for a visit to Virginia, returned home on the 2:21 train yesterday afternoon.

The men had an exceedingly pleasant and interesting trip. They are all three veterans of the Civil War and one of the objects of their trip was to visit the battlefields of Fredericksburg, Petersburg and Richmond.

The two score years which have elapsed have wrought a good many changes in the vicinity of the battlefields. Timber has been cut down and new buildings have been erected...

Mr. Eckman was able to locate the spot where he had assisted to bury his comrade, Philip Eckman, after the battle of Fair Oaks or "Seven Pines" as it was called by the Rebels...

The remains of Philip Eckman, however, no longer rest on the spot, but along with those of Samuel H. Kurtz, another Danville boy, soon after the war were removed to the National Cemetery at Fair Oaks.

Mr. Eckman stated that he buried his cousin Philip and Samuel H. Kurtz side by side, inscribing the name of each on a plain board erected at the head of the grave.

The name of Philip Eckman, it seems, became partially obliterated, which after his removal led to some confusion and error in cataloging his name in the National Cemetery.

The original plan of bringing the remains of Philip Eckman to Danville for burial may now be abandoned. He is sleeping in a beautiful cemetery, surrounded by the graves of his comrades.

\$500 REWARD FOR ASSAILANT ON BATTLESHIP

Shot by a foreigner who he had ordered off the land, J. M. Fairchilds of West Berwick, has offered a reward of \$500 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the man who committed the act.

The shooting occurred Monday evening when Mr. Fairchilds and several assistants were in the corn field shooting corn. Hearing a noise Mr. Fairchilds walked towards the woods and saw two foreigners out hunting.

Mr. Fairchilds was taken to his home and Dr. Reagan, of Berwick, and Dr. Gardner, of Bloomsburg, were summoned. An investigation showed that it would be unwise to attempt to remove the shot, almost a hundred in number, Monday night.

Mr. Gaskins is determined to make his assailant answer for his crime and to that end has offered a reward of \$500 for information that will lead to the arrest and conviction of the guilty party.

Five Men Injured During Big Fire. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21.—Five men were injured and three horses were cremated during a fire which today destroyed the planing mill and lumber sheds of the Pennsylvania Lumber Company in the northeastern section of the city.

The stock was owned by Albert L. Brown, who estimates his loss at \$15,000. The loss on the machinery is estimated at \$25,000, partly insured. A vacant factory building a short distance from the planing mill was also burned about the same time, causing a loss of \$2,000 on machinery. The fire marshal suspects the fires were the work of incendiaries.

EXTRA SESSION OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—President Roosevelt today issued his proclamation calling an extra session of congress on Monday, November 9, as follows:

"By the President of the United States. A Proclamation. Whereas, by the resolution of the senate of March 19, 1903, the approval by congress of the reciprocal commercial convention between the United States and the Republic of Cuba, signed at Havana on December 11, 1902, is necessary before the said convention shall take effect;

"And, whereas, it is important to the public interests of the United States that the said convention shall become operative as early as may be;

"Now, therefore, I, Theodor Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, do hereby proclaim and declare that an extraordinary session requires the convening of both Houses of the Congress of the United States at their respective chambers in the city of Washington on the ninth day of November, next, at 12 o'clock, noon, to the end that they may consider and determine whether the approval of the Congress shall be given to the said convention.

"All persons entitled to act as members of the 58th Congress are required to take notice of this proclamation. "Given under my hand, and the seal of the United States, at Washington, the twentieth day of October, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and three, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-eighth.

"THEODORE ROOSEVELT, "By the President." JOHN HAY, "Secretary of State."
