A NOTE OF CONFIDENCE

Pennsylvanians Will Sustain National and State Administrations. NO CHECK UPON PROSPERITY

Republicans Confidently Look For a Great Party Victory in the State at the Election Which Will Be Held on Tuesday Next.

When Senator Penrose was here a few days ago consulting with Governor Pennypacker and Senator Quay he expressed the opinion that Pennsylvania will give a larger majority for the Republican candidate for state treasurer next Tuesday than has ever been given for any candidate for that office in this state.

THE PRODUCTIONS OF A GREAT REPUBLICAN VICTORY ARE MADE BECAUSE IT IS THE BELIEF THAT THE PEOPLE OF PENNSYLVANIA ARE SATISFIED WITH THEIR NATIONAL AND STATE GOVERNMENTS AND THEY ARE DETERMINED TO WANT "WELL GOVERNED ALONE."

When state issues are discussed by those who are forecasting the result of next Tuesday's election, it is admitted on all sides that the Republicans never entered a state campaign with stronger candidates, nor with a better record in the administration of the state affairs.

STATE ISSUES DISCUSSED.

The platform of the Republican state convention which placed these candidates in the field, while naturally making most prominent the national phase of the present campaign, did not fail to refer with satisfaction and pride to the splendid condition of the state finances, the liberal appropriations made to the public schools and the hospitals and the charities of the state, the enactment of the Good Roads bill and the other meritorious measures which were passed at the last session of the general assembly.

READY FOR STILL HUNT

Republicans Prepared to Block the Democracy's Game. NEXT TUESDAY ELECTION DAY

Young Men Are Volunteering All Over the State to Work to Get Out the Republican Vote, As Did Many Who Became Great Leaders.

Philadelphia, Oct. 27.—With election day but one week off Chairman Penrose and the Republican state committee, has practically completed his work of this campaign, and for the remaining days of the contest the whole responsibility of the canvass has been shifted to the members of the county committees, the members of the village committees and the other active workers throughout the state, upon whom the organization depends to get the vote to the polls.

While Chairman Penrose and Secretary Andrews will remain at headquarters until after the returns are in, they are now sending out their last batch of mail and that they have no doubt that the committee rooms are being laid off, as all their work has been done.

During the last few days the most earnest appeals have been made to the county chairmen to spur their associates in the county committees to get the vote to the polls. It is true that the Democrats of Pennsylvania have not for years been so demoralized and absolutely without organization and that they have not undertaken to put up a fight in the open during the canvass this fall. But it is also true that this fact has led to apathy in the ranks of the Republicans.

PARTY MEN ARE ALEKT.

While Democrats are secretly speculating upon the national political situation and are determined to get any advantage possible out of the election next Tuesday, it is fair to say that many Republicans have been aroused to the importance of the situation, and from now until the ballots are counted will work zealously to have their party make a satisfactory showing in the returns. They propose to go among their neighbors and have them arrange to get the polls early on Tuesday next.

REPUBLICAN VOLUNTEERS.

The Republican who volunteers his services to work at the polls on election day is deserving to be enrolled among the "Honor Men" of his party. It is becoming to be the proper thing for young men to tender their services to the county committees for election day and in this way become acquainted with the voters of their respective precincts. The association and acquaintanceships thus made place the young men in line for consideration at the hands of the party leaders and frequently to advancement in unexpected quarters.

Lincoln, Grant, Garfield, Maine, McKinley, Roosevelt, and in fact nearly all the men who have been signally honored by the Republican party started in politics working at their polling places on election day.

OFFICIAL BALLOT RECEIVED

The election will take place on Tuesday next, November 3rd. In this county there is no contest for any of the offices except that of Sheriff. The candidates for the Sheriffalty are losing no time this week and are making it a point to see as many of the voters personally as possible.

An official ballot conforming with the law as amended in 1903 has been received at the Commissioners office. Although in the main the new ballot resembles the old it differs somewhat in arrangement and wording, which may leave the voter less liable to make mistakes.

In the old ballot the first paragraph of instructions told how to proceed to indicate a vote for each candidate. The second paragraph explained that marking within the circle at the head of the columns would be equivalent to a mark opposite every name which followed in the column.

In the amended ballot the arrangement is such as to lead the eye direct to the provisions for straight voting and the first paragraph of instructions sets forth: "To vote a straight party ticket mark a cross in the square opposite the name of the party of your choice in the first column."

The new ballot is about the size of the old and contains the names of the following parties with their candidates: Republican, Democratic, Socialist, Citizens', Independence, Labor, and Prohibition. Names of local candidates are printed on the ballot as follows: Sheriff—Republican, George Rudy Sechler; Democratic, George Maters; Prohibition, Levi B. Sechler.

HAS SURRENDERED TO THE POLICE

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Daniel Weisenberg, the traveling salesman whose name has been mentioned in connection with the murder of Miss Mabel Bechtel, of Allentown, Pa., surrendered himself at police headquarters early this morning.

Weisenberg said he had not heard of the death of Miss Bechtel until late last night and as soon as he ascertained that he was wanted he came to police headquarters. Detective Sergeant Knouse, of Allentown, who was in Newark looking for Weisenberg, came here this morning and placed him under arrest.

Weisenberg said: "I saw Miss Mabel Bechtel for a few minutes Sunday night at her home in Allentown. I did not take her carriage riding on Monday at any time nor did I see or hear of her on that day. At the time she was supposed to have gone riding with me I was in a barber shop in South Bethlehem, where I live."

Alfred Eckstein, the girl's fiance, and her brother, who were summoned by the police yesterday were released after a close examination.
