There is one drawback, however, place to dump the ashes. The trouble is that conditions are extraordinary this year and they effect the disposal of the ash and garbage pile as well as a great many other things.

The usual dumping place on the river bank is entirely cut off by the blocked condition of the River road as well as by the absence of the bridge at the 11.22 A. M. 6.04 P. M. Creek's Mouth. It is even impossible to reach the dumping ground by driving down the other road from Northumberland street, as the big mound of ice at the Southern end of the canal bridge at Lover's Leap effectually shuts out all travel at that point.


