In that manner the race continued for fully 15 minutes, at the expiration of which time Mr. Moore succeeded in getting hold of the rope that was fastened to the animal's horns. New License Law.

The bill introduced by Senator God charles in the Senate provides that in each judicial district containing les than five hundred thousand population the governor shall appoint three exciscommissioners. They are to hold officbased on the population of their respective districts, as follows: Less than 40,000, \$250; less than 100,000, \$500; less than 200,000,\$700; more than 200, 000 \$1,000, with mileage and other expenses. The salaries and expenses are o be paid by the counties. 
