MR. LAUMASTER'S TALK ON ALGIERS

Mr. Laumaster delivered the fifth of a series of addresses on his trip to the Holy Land in the Y. M. C. A. Hall yesterday afternoon, before a large audience.

The speaker first described the entrance to the city of Algiers. He spoke of the beautiful harbor and bay where their ship anchored.

Among the places of interest visited was the great wall or breakwater, which was built by Christian slaves, over 80,000 being engaged three years in the work of building it.

The view of Algiers from the bay is most beautiful, the city being on a range of hills rising in amphitheatre form around an artificial harbor.

It was in the Arab quarter of the city that the party got their first glimpse of Oriental life. The population here is a mixture of Moors, Arabs, Belgians, Turks, Romans and Jews.

FILTER PLANT FOR BOILERS

The new boiler has arrived at the Water Works continuing in part the filter to be installed in connection with the boiler for the purpose of eliminating the mineral substances.

The Borroughs filter beds are rolled upon to separate the water from most of the solid and impure matter held in suspension.

It has been discovered that when water is heated to a certain point the mineral substances may be precipitated by the application of soda.

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AN ORDINANCE.

REQUIRING AND PERMITTING THE OWNERS OF CERTAIN PROPERTIES IN THE BOROUGH OF DANVILLE, MONTOUR COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, TO MAKE PROPER CONNECTIONS WITH AND USE ALL SEWERS CONSTRUCTED BY THE SAID BOROUGH, PROVIDING FOR THE METHOD OF MAKING SUCH CONNECTIONS.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Chief Burgess, and by the Town Council of the Borough of Danville, in the County of Montour and State of Pennsylvania, in Council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same as follows:

SECTION 1. That all sewers constructed by the said Borough of Danville be and the same are hereby declared to be open for public use and for proper connection therewith.

SECTION 2. That every owner of property in the said Borough of Danville abutting on or adjoining any street or alley in which are any one of the said public sewers thus constructed, shall be and he is hereby at his, her, its, or their own sole cost and expense uniform and proper connection with such respective and proper sewer in the said Borough of Danville.

SECTION 3. That each and every owner of property in the same respective Borough of Danville but whose said property does not abut or adjoin any such street or alley in which are any one of the said public sewers as aforesaid, shall have the right and privilege to make such connection with and use such respective and proper sewer under the same regulations, upon the same conditions and at the same price, respectively, as those whose properties thus abut or adjoin such streets and alleys as aforesaid and which said regulations, conditions and prices, respectively, are hereinafter more specifically set forth.

SECTION 4. That the manner and regulations, relative to all such connections shall be such as shall be determined by the Board of Health of the Water Works of the said Borough of Danville, out of such materials, in such a manner, at such place and in such a strict accordance with such orders and specifications as the said Committee on Sewers shall require, designate, provide, and that the proper making of all such connections the following specific and uniform regulations shall obtain and prevail:

SECTION 5. That the following regulations shall govern the planning of all house connections with all of the said sewers:

SECTION 6. That all connections with the said sewers through glazed or vitrified, terra cotta pipes of adequate dimension and capacity, properly jointed, ventilated and trapped, accessible for convenient inspection, shall be made below the reach of frost.
