The road in question was petitioned for by some twenty sented that they labored under great inconvenience for want of a public town of Danville near the property terminus being in the Borough of Dan-

That said highway between the point where it crosses the said canal and the point near the residence of Mary Shepperson lies low, is swampy and at certain seasons of the year is practically useless and impassable; that by another route the said distance between said points could be covered on dry and solid ground thereby making it safe and convenient for the public use at all seasons of the year.

The viewers in their report stated hat they had vacated the road decribed above and had obtained a reease from the State Hospital for any damages that might rise from openng the new road; from Mary Shepperson they had failed to obtain a reease for damages but had awarded her eventy-five dollars.

The exceptions filed by the Danville and Sunbury Street Railway Company set forth as follows: That public notice of the proposed view was not properly given. That the road laid out is an extension of Market street in the Borough and is not laid out by the viewers in accordance with the law governing such extension. That part of the road laid out by the viewers said viewers are without the power to lay out and establish any such street. That no notice was given to the

Danville and Sunbury Street Railway Company of the view to be had and he said railway company having been chartered to lay its track upon and over the street and road returned to be vacated, the said rail way company baying all necessary rights to lay its tracks upon and over the same such vacation without notice to it is in derogation of its rights and subversive of its charter.


