Working at a Dizzy Height.

Peter J. Keefer, Superintendent of Water Works and Superintendent of Sewers, who has turned his hand to smoke stack repairs, has made excellent progress in scaffolding the big

chimney at the Water Works, satisfactorily demonstrating that he is quite as much at home a hundred feet or so above the earth as he is battling

with conditions in the deep sewer trenches. As described in these columns Tues-

day morning in scaffolding the stack Mr. Keefer found himself up against a pretty stiff proposition. All the lumber needed had to be drawn up on the Water Works at the western end by rope and tackle and carried over

the roof to the base of the stack. Notwithstanding by Tuesday night the scaffold was practically completed. Yesterday morning some finishing
