Stahl. ess firing and less coal to operate the plant. The attaches of the water works will now enter upon an experiment to determine just what proportion of the coal formerly used will be saved. According to the figures of experts 25 per cent. less fuel will be needed.

Many people will be interested to know that formerly four tons of coal were required every twenty-four hours o operate the water and the light plant. The saving of one-fourth in fuel would mean a big thing in the course of a year and would cut down the cost of electric light to a still lower figure.
