ICY SIDEWALKS.

The pavements in many places are quite icy and great care should be ex-TO PROSECUTION ercised by persons in walking. It is at such times as the present rather than when a coat of sleet covers the sidewalks that persons become negligent, and dangerous falls occur. Many a siege of typhoid fever or kindred illness. How often it occurs, especially with those advanced in years, that a slight fall renders the victim a cripple duty in the premises.
