The book of the local registrar show that twenty-one births took place in this registration district of Montour county during the month of March. The work alluded to is the painting of three wagons for the Moxie Nerve Food company, of New England, two of the vehicles being in the form familiar to most persons, a big bottle on wheels, and the other, a top wagon with the roof supported by four big bottles, one

at each corner. Mr. Hunt is one of the finest carriage painters in this section and the unique and ornamental form of the Moxie wagons lend themselves very nicely to his extraordinary ability and the result is something little short of dazzling. Only one wagon is wholly completed. The main body-that is the big bottle-is painted a French carmine, the lettering being of gold shaded tastefully in a variety of colors. The running gear is painted white, striped and ornamented in blue and red. In addition there is an abund-

ance of scroll work. These wagons will be completed and out out on the road in time for the summer's trade.
