Danville has already appealed to the State board of health, not through a numerously signed petition, it is true, but through the local board of health. a medium which should be as effective. The response, however, was not of a sort to inspire much confidence among our citizens.

Dr. Dixon, accepting the facts as presented merely stated that, if the canal was a nuisance, the owners should be obliged to abate it. Should they refuse to do so, Dr. Dixon suggested that the borough make such improvements as necessary and enter a lien upon the canal property. The local authorities were not impressed with the practicability of this scheme and nothing was done in the premises.

The situation at Bloomsburg is not nearly so bad as at Danville, as the canal instead of intersecting the heart of the town as here merely affects the outlying portions. However, if the situation there calls for such prompt and determined measures surely Danville can not afford to remain passive in the matter. Nearly a year has elapsed since the matter was laid before the State board of health. It might be a good thing to take up the subject again. Dr. Dixon might have something new to offer.

THE BATTLE FIELD

A couple of very interesting souven rs of the civil war have been left at this office by John B. Sees, of West Hemlock township, who served in Company D. 7th., Pennsylvania cav alry during the great conflict. One of the documents is general orders No. 5, issued at military division of the Mississippi, Macon, Ga, April 23, 1865, which contains the farewill address of Brigadier General Long; the other is a copy of the "Selma Union" a small newspaper printed by the solners at Selma, Ala, and which bears the date of April 8, 1865, Mr. Sees thinks it would be difficult to find another copy either of the farewell adlress or the little newspaper anywhere

in this section of the country. General Long, who was seriously vounded in the engagement before selma, was obliged to retire from service. The farewell address is of interest as showing to what extert officers appreciate the bravery of the enlisted men. After commending them Selma General Long concludes: "Having naturally no love for war and if t should be my fortune, as I hope it may be, never again to hear the fire of gun in battle. I shall consider that it is honor enough to last me the renainder of my life to have had the honor to command you on that oc-

At the fall of Selma there fell into the hands of the Union army along with two thousand prisoners, the naval foundry and machine shops, and the extensive arsenal, filled with a variety of military munitions.
